




#### Quick Start Guide



Read the book WITH your child. You read the "regular" text, and he/she reads the big, red words, sort of like reading the different parts in a play.

Help your child sound out the words as needed.





Read the book several times. This helps develop the eye muscles and left-to-right reading patterns that are necessary for reading.

Don't rush it. Body builders don't train in a day – neither does a child.





If your child is having difficulty, he/she might need more practice with simple short vowel words. Read or re-read the Progressive Phonics Beginner Books a few times, and then try this book again.

And most important of all, HAVE FUN!



Words that a child should be able to read by now are printed with BLUE ink – if your child can't read them easily, go back and review the earlier books.

The new words being learned are "big, red words".



Is my clock sick?
It only says tick.



Words or grammatical constructions that a child has not learned yet are written in black ink.

These words are supposed to be read by the parent/teacher. \*\*


\*\* Your child can try to read them, but don't worry too much about them. They are taught later, either in later Progressive Phonics books, or in spelling or grammar at school.

The letter "y" says "yuh" at the beginning of a word:




The letter "y" says "I" at the end of a very short word:







But if the letter "y" is next to the letter "a," the "a" calls out


I try to put my lunch on a tray, to take my lunch outside. I try, try, try but the tray, tray, tray, tray is too big for my size.




Mother, may I stay at the zoo? These nice monkeys asked me to. So, may I stay at the zoo tonight? The monkeys say I will be alright.




I play all day in mud and dirt. I play so hard, it is just like work. I play with my truck. I play with my car. I play all day out in the yard.

run away?





Remember, there are different ways to spell the "ay" sound


These three spellings are the ones we use the most:






"My maid may make a cake for me. My maid may make my tea.

toys and other stuff.





If I take a tray of tea on the train with me, I must try not to take a nap. If I do, then boo, boo, hoo, the tray spills in my lap.



Sometimes you see a letter "e" next to the letter "y."


This is tricky because the "e" sometimes calls out its own name — "E!" — and sometimes the "e" says "A!" instead.

made the same Way.




Look at those people standing in the sun. They wait, wait, wait for the bus to come.

In these two words, the letter "u" says "I" and the letter "y" doesn't say anything.






I went to buy a cake at the shop, but the guy at the shop said, "Stop, stop, stop."

When the letter "o" is next to the letter "y," they say "Oy!"







This toy is for a boy—

To join my club, you must be a girl. To join my club, your hair must curl. A boy can join if he will sit in a chair and let me curl his long, pink hair.




My coin can jump; my coin can flip. See? My coin can do a trick.





Two words with the letter "y" are really tricky — "eye" and "bye."


In these two words, the letter "e" doesn't say anything, and the letter "y" says, "I."












My eye can see, late at night. My eye can see without a light. My other eye prefers to sleep, just like my big, old smelly feet.
